The above is a first team picture from 16<sup>th</sup> December 1967 before a 9-16 defeat at Halifax. This defeat took Trinity to thirteenth in the league table before an unbeaten run of sixteen games took them

to second place, Wembley and the 1968 RL Championship.

Neil Fox, Harold Poynton, Ray Owen, David Jeanes, Bernard Prior and Don Fox were all missing from the first team at Thrum Hall that day, with scrum half, Alford, making his first appearance of the season and Spawforth his second, on the wing. Mick Morgan and George Shepherd were the unused substitutes that day.

John Godfrey scored the solitary try and Spawforth kicking three goals.

David Jones and Colin Dixon scored the Halifax tries with Welsh full back,
Ronnie James kicking five goals. Future Welsh international, Jim Mills was in
the second row of a Halifax side, coached by former Trinity scrum half,
Stan Kielty, in front of a 3,960 attendance on a cold, frosty winters
Saturday afternoon.



## Committee & Officials ... 54 Years Ago



As stated in previous, similar newsletters, the Trinity programmes of the 1960s and 1970s were one of the most informative in the league and a dream for historians when researching matches, players, appearances etc.

This publication from 1962 had 22 pages, with the first page providing a list of staff.

Back in 1962, Alderman Frank West was starting his third term as Club President with Bill Simpson as Chairman and former player, Ron Rylance as Vice Chairman. There were another seven committeemen with Eddie Thomas was Secretary-Manager.

We had sub-committees for finance, ground, team selection, Trinity Juniors, pools, programme and Trinity Supporters' Club. We had auditors, solicitors, doctors, architects and advisories. Add to these the on-field staff of coach, trainer, masseur and players ... those were the days.

These were the days when the committee selected the weekend playing team and in 1962 that responsibility fell to the above committeemen, Ron Rylance, David

Armitage, Les Pounder and John Ridge. They did not do a bad job, as this era was the most successful in the club's history. The club doctor was Dr. Harry Knowles who was in post for twenty four years (1962–86)

## The First...

Trinity's first game of the new decade was on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> January 1960 when Hull came to Belle Vue. Trinity were in second place in the league table having just beaten Castleford 20-2 on Christmas Day and demolished Leeds, 39-5 at Headingley on Boxing Day and had only lost three of their twenty one league games so far. Hull were in tenth place but had had a tough week with three away games in the previous nine days, a 13-2 Christmas Day victory at Hull KR, a 30-0 win at Dewsbury on Boxing Day and a midweek visit to Oldham squeezed in, too, returning with a 6-30 loss.



A tough Xmas saw Trinity make two changes to the above programme sheet with Tony Thomas replacing Stan Smith on the wing and Albert Firth replacing Joe Smith in the forwards. Hull had a formidable pack with Johnny Whiteley leading from the front and Mick Scott, Cyril Sykes and the Drake brothers, Jim and Bill, adding the size and power.

On a bright, Saturday afternoon Trinity totally outplayed the Airlie Birds, 34-9 with Albert Firth (2), Fred Smith, Derek Turner, Harold Poynton and Alan Skene scoring the tries with Neil Fox kicking eight goals. The attendance was 9,839.

Trinity's unbeaten run stretched to twelve games until a defeat at the Boulevard in March followed by another eight wins in the next ten until the play offs. Hull progressed too, going on a long unbeaten run after this defeat, winning their next eighteen games before a 4-9 loss at home to St Helens at Easter, finishing third in the league table behind Trinity in second. They met at Belle Vue in the Championship semi final, Trinity winning 24-4 and a week later at Wembley, Trinity winning the Challenge Cup, 38-5.

The first programme of 1960 was packed with local interest. The adverts included the 'Griffin Hotel' and its 'free and easy nightly with the Griffinaires trio', S.Stead's Builders on Heath Common, Simpsons Shoes on Westmoreland Street, AW Winter the dairyman in Belle Vue, the British Oak Inn in Stanley, John Ridge's Painting & decorating company in Kirkgate, the Dolphin Hotel, the Chocodero Café in Little Westgate and the Duncan Inn in Thornes Lane run by ex-Trinity loose forward, Len

#### ...The Last

The last game played by Trinity in the 1960s was for the visit of Batley on 26<sup>th</sup> December 1969; a change from the usual Boxing Day visits to Headingley. A 5,867 crowd attended to see a 20-7 Trinity victory.

The 'Glory Years' were well behind Trinity by the decade's end and the 1969-70 season saw Trinity win only one of their first thirteen games, including an 8-15 loss at Batley's Mount Pleasant in November. The 60's legends had retired, or moved on, and Ian Brooke had just relinquished the club captaincy with Bob Haigh leading the club for the first time.



Despite Trinity's poor season, they still had three internationals in their side with David Jeanes complementing the previous season's World Cup members, Brooke and Haigh. Matt McLeod and Tom Hill were two Cumbrians in the front row and David Hawley was a popular, hard working loose forward. New stars were starting out their careers with scrum half, Kevin Harkin playing his ninth first team game and David Topliss in his second season. Former Trinity scrum half, Tommy Gorman was now in the Batley half backs. As noted above, Ian Brooke (2), Stuart Carlton and Keith Slater scored the tries with Carlton (3) and Kevin Harkin kicking the goals.

The club programme in 1969 was still as informative as previous years with statistics, records and honours for future historians. The adverts included Derek Turner's removals & haulage company, Newmillerdam Motors with Neil Fox, Duke of York Hotel in Agbrigg Road, Victoria Motors in Newton Hill and two Blackpool hotels run by former players, Chesterfields Guest House (Jack Perry) and Heatonia Guest House (Ray Jaques).

There were also full adverts for Trinity Pools and the Trinity

Development Association based in Zetland Street with bingo, raffles and
fruit machines. The new Trinity Supporters' tea bar was also advertised,
selling sweets, pies and pasties aswell as ties, scarves, badges, pens,
autograph books and teddy bears. The most expensive item were the

45 shilling teddy bears!
