Good, clear team pictures from the early 1980s are few and far between but the above is a unique photo as it is the only one, we believe, which included Wally Lewis, the Queensland and Australian test legend who played ten games with us in the 1983-84 season.

This was taken at Halifax in his last ever game, an RL Challenge Cup first round match on 12th February 1984.


Trinity won the game 19-7 with Wally signing off with two tries, Brian Adams and David Jones scoring the other two with Colin Maskill only converting one of six attempts, and Nigel Stephenson dropping a goal just after the break.

Lewis was an obvious target for the Halifax 'hitmen' with the hooker spending time in the sin bin for late fouls. Wally's 'minder' Lindsay Gill had a storming game, gaining man of the match honours in front of a 4.402 crowd.

Following this game, Lewis returned home, Trinity lost their second round cup game, 12-20 at home to York, Derek Turner resigned as coach, the remaining eight league games were all lost and Trinity were relegated!



Committee & Officials ... 35 Years Ago



The quality of the Trinity programmes started to fade in the 1980s, after the retirement of editor John Lindley. Gone were the informative facts, figures and match records replaced by advertisements and blurred photographs.

From 1975 to 1980, Trinity had this design with the staff and committee noted in a box in the bottom right hand corner and advertisements on the left.

The committee were well known names of the 1980s with Chairman, Trevor Woodward and Vice Chairman, David Garthwaite leading the way. The committee also included the very well respected, Les Pounder, David Barras, John Fawcett, Terry Kelly, John Sellers and Andrew Slater. Jim Walker was President and the secretary's home telephone number was still available, too, Mr Alan Pearman.



The First...

Trinity's first home game of the new decade was on Sunday 13th January 1980 when second-placed, Widnes, came to town. The 'Team of the 70s', Widnes, arrived at Belle Vue as Lancashire Cup holders but had just lost the John Player Final to Bradford, 0-6, the week before. Trinity, in 8th position in the league had just defeated Leigh and were confident of victory.



Both teams were virtually at full strength with only Keith Rayne missing for Trinity and goal kicking full back, Mick Burke missing for the Chemics. Trinity took an early lead through an Alan McCurrie try but Widnes equalised with a Stuart Wright try and it was 5-5 at the interval. Widnes's class showed in the second half with tries to Aspey, George and Gorley and Trinity's two tries from Kirkbride and McDermott were too late, Widnes winning 19-13.

The numbers in brackets on the team sheet noted the tackle count which showed that Widnes had much more possession and the Trinity back three, led by Trevor Skerrett's forty efforts they made ninety five tackles between them, as opposed to Widnes's back three of forty five tackles.




As mentioned earlier, the early 1980s programme was packed with advertisements and the local businesses of thirty five years ago make interesting reading. All players had local businesses sponsoring them (see team sheet) and the match ball had local sponsors too.


Throughout the programme ex-players were well recognised, including Jonathan Parkin & Son (Frozen Food distributers), Topliss & King Heating Engineers, Trevor Skerrett's builders and Eric Ingham's plumbing. Who also remembers the Stoneleigh Hotel, Ingham Sports, Shapers Health Studio in Unity House, Hansons DIY, The Viking Restaurant in Methley and the Admiral Duncan Inn on Thornes Lane? Happy Days!

...The Last

The last game played by Trinity in the 1980s was for the visit of Featherstone Rovers on 31st December 1989. Despite having players of the calibre of Paul Newlove, Deryck Fox, Jeff Grayshon and Peter Smith in their squad, Rovers found themselves in the relegation zone at Christmas 1989, seven points adrift of safety with only two league wins all season. One of those was at home to Trinity five days earlier, 15-8 on Boxing Day and they had reached the Yorkshire Cup Final, losing to Bradford. Trinity were in 7th and apart from Boxing Day had not played for a month.



The teams showed some changes to the programme after the Boxing Day clash, Fox and Jackson missing for Trinity with Zelei on the wing and Lazenby at stand off with the pack shuffling positions. Billy Conway coming in at hooker with ex-internationals, James Leuluai and Keith Rayne on the bench. Two magnificent tries in the opening nine minutes sent Trinity on their way, the first a length of the field move and the second, a Chris Perry score after an Andy Kelly offload. Ropati replied for Rovers, but just on half time a piece of Lazenby-Conway half back magic saw Andy Mason score by the posts. Ropati replied again before another piece of Lazenby magic put Eden in for his second. Trevor Clark scored late on but Trinity won in fine style, 22-14, watched by 6,794.



The off field staff had changed considerably in the ten years since the start of the 80s. Stars such as Richard Harris, Adam Faith and Michael Parkinson found their names in the honorary section with a few Wakefield counsellors on the committee too. Since promotion in 1988 the programme had returned to its previous excellence too. A special mention to club doctor at this time, Dr. Alistair McGowan, a true expert in his field.
